Andrea Chan and Alan Haynie will give a presentation on the Socioeconomic Aspects in Stock Assessments Workshop (SEASAW) report: Recommendations for Increasing Assessment Accuracy and Improving Management Advice. Drs. Chan and Haynie will discuss the overall objectives as well as the specific goals of this initiative. Drs. Chan and Haynie will also present the recommendations provided in the report. Agenda Item IX: Review: SEDAR 68 Operational Assessment for Gulf of Mexico Scamp

Committee input and next steps: Dr. Katie Siegfried (SEFSC) will present the findings of the SEDAR 68 Operational Assessment of Gulf of Mexico Scamp. SEDAR 68 began in 2020 with a research track to build the modeling environment for this stock assessment, as it is a first for scamp in the Gulf. Dr. Siegfried will review the model's construction and development, included indices of relative abundance, base model estimations and results, diagnostics, and yield projections based on the Council's currently defined status determination criteria. Scamp is currently considered part of the shallow-water grouper complex (along with black grouper, yellowfin grouper, and yellowmouth grouper). Also, commercial harvest of scamp is regulated under an individual fishing quota (IFQ) program such that when a shareholder of commercial shallow-water grouper allocation has landed that allocation for the year, they can still land scamp on any remaining deep-water grouper allocation. The SSC should consider the information presented and make any appropriate recommendations about whether the assessment is consistent with the best scientific information available (BSIA). The SSC should also consider whether it is more appropriate to examine a separate catch limit for scamp, including whether to break scamp out from the shallow-water grouper complex, and make any commensurate recommendations to the Council.

Agenda Item XI: Review of Scope of Work for 2025 Operational Assessment of Lane

Snapper

Action: Discussion and recommendations

Committee input and next steps: Mr. Ryan Rindone (Council Staff) will review the scope of work for the planned operational assessment of Gulf lane snapper with the SSC. This operational assessment is tentatively scheduled to occur in 2025, using data through 2023. The last catch analysis of lane snapper was performed as an interim analysis in 2019, which used catch-per-unit-effort data from the headboat fleet through 2018, and found the stock to be healthy. The SSC should evaluate the proposed scope of work and provide recommendations as appropriate. The SSC should also consider whether the scope of work recommended for this assessment would benefit from topical working groups to address any key issues. This scope of work will then be sent to SEDAR for consideration in the development of the terms of reference for the same assessment. Alternatively, the SSC may also recommend another interim analysis be conducted for lane snapper, if the SSC thinks that an operational assessment is not presently necessary to monitor the health of the stock.

Agenda Item XII: Review of Scope of Work for 2025 Operational Assessment of Gag

Grouper

Action: Discussion and recommendations

Committee input and next steps: Mr. Rindone will review the scope of work for the planned operational assessment of Gulf gag grouper with the SSC. This operational assessment is tentatively scheduled to occur in 2025, using data through 2023. The last stock assessment for gag grouper was performed as an alternative model run using the base model for SEDAR 72, and swapped the Marine Recreational Information Program's (MRIP) recreational landings and discards data for the private angling and state for-hire fleets for the same from the state of Florida's State Reef Fish Survey (SRFS). This SRFS run was considered consistent with BSIA by the SSC in July 2022, and estimated gag grouper to be overfished and experiencing overfishing as of 2019. A rebuilding plan to end overfishing of gag grouper (Reef Fish Amendment 56) is being developed by the Council. The SSC should evaluate the proposed scope of work and provide recommendations as appropriate. The SSC should also consider whether the scope of work recommended for this assessment would benefit from topical working groups to address any key issues. This scope of work will then be sent to SEDAR for consideration in the development of the terms of reference for the same assessment.

Mexico Migratory Group of King Mackerel

Action: Discussion and recommendations

Committee input and next steps: Mr. Rindone will review the scope of work for the planned operational assessment of the Gulf migratory group of king mackerel (Gulf king mackerel) with the SSC. This operational assessment is tentatively scheduled to occur in 2025, using data through 2023. The last stock assessment for Gulf king mackerel was SEDAR 38 Update, which updated recreational landings and discards data with those calibrated to MRIP's Fishing Effort Survey. SEDAR 38 Update also revised the estimate of shrimp bycatch, and all data in the model were updated through the 2017 – 2018 fishing year. The SSC reviewed SEDAR 38 Update in 2020, considered it to be consistent with BSIA, and estimated that the stock was not overfished and not experiencing overfishing. However, the SSC noted depressed recruitment in the stock for approximately 13 years compared to the long-term average from the data-rich period for the species (1986-present). Further, the 2021/2022 fishing season marks the first time on over 20 years that the commercial sector has not landed its quota. The SSC should evaluate the proposed scope of work and provide recommendations as appropriate. The SSC should also consider whether the scope of work recommended for this assessment would benefit from topical working groups to address any key issues. This scope of work will then be sent to SEDAR for consideration in the development of the terms of reference for the same assessment.

Agenda Item XIV: Review of Updated Projections for Gulf of Mexico Gag Grouper using

SRFS

Action: Presentation, discussion, and recommendations

Committee input and next steps: Drs. Lisa Ailloud and Katie Siegfried (SEFSC) will review updated catch projections for gag grouper based on the alternative SRFS run considered to be BSIA by the SSC in July 2022. These updated projections consider a revised sector allocation of 65% recreational, 35% commercial, based on the application of the SRFS landings and discards to the historical reference period (1986 – 2005) used to set the current sector allocation for gag grouper (presently equal to 61% recreational, 39% commercial). As part of its work to develop a rebuilding plan for gag grouper (Reef Fish Amendment 56), the Council considered other reference periods (1986 – 2009 [pre-IFQ] and 1986 – 2019 [data-rich period]), and found those referenced periods to result in similar average landings ratios between the commercial and recreational fleets. The SEFSC will provide projections based on four scenarios: the minimum time to rebuild (T_{Min}) with fishing mortality set equal to zero (F = 0; 12 years); 75% of F at 40% spawning potential ratio (SPR: the current proxy for maximum sustainable yield; 19 years); T_{Min} plus one generation period (8 years for gag grouper; 20 years total), and TMin * 2 (24 years). The SSC should ask questions as appropriate, and evaluate the projections under the revised sector allocation scenario and rebuilding timelines to determine whether they are consistent with BSIA and suitable to inform management advice.
