
Review of Past Discussions on Charter For-hire Data Collection

Ad hoc AP Meeting January 10, 2024







- ➤ Pilot study conducted from Sept. 2010 through Aug. 2011
 - ➤ Florida: 322 vessels; Texas: 36 vessels reported

General Findings

- Could not achieve census-level compliance for catch and effort
- Difficulty verifying catch from dock intercepts
- No way to verify if a trip occurred or not
- At-sea observers would be costly to implement
- Prior to implementation of any new logbook reporting program, a well-thought out plan to reinforce the reporting requirement after the start date should be in place so that it can be executed quickly.

Amendment 40

• Defined, within the recreational sector, distinct private angling and federal for-hire components of the recreational red snapper fishery

Similar action put on hold and AP recommendations

- Amendment 41: Federally permitted for-hire vessels that do not participate in the SRHS, and thus do not have recorded landings histories, are referred to here as charter vessels. Amendment 41 evaluates allocation-based management approaches for charter vessels.
- Ad Hoc Red Snapper For-Hire AP: Recommended the Council develop a data collection program for Gulf charter for-hire reef fish permit holders (May 2015)




Technical fisheries staff provided a list of data collection recommendations

- Mandatory participation
- Census design approach
- Trip-level reporting
- Use of several different reporting platforms
- Dockside validation of logbook trip reports
- Validation of vessel activity
- Calibration with existing survey for no less than 3 years
- Provided an estimated budget




Generic amendment: Modifications to Charter Vessel and Headboat Reporting Requirements

- Required electronic reporting of logbooks for charter vessels having a Reef fish and/or Coastal Migratory Pelagic permit
- ➤ Hail-out/hail-in when departing for any trip
- Require vessel operators to submit fishing records via NMFS approved hardware/software with GPS capabilities that, at a minimum, archive vessel position data to NMFS. The GPS portion of the hardware is permanently affixed to the vessel



Program Roll-out:

- Phase 1
 - January 5, 2021: Required hail-in/hail-out and electronic logbook submission
- Phase II
 - December 13, 2021: Required Vessel Monitoring System (VMS) to be operational



<u>Framework Action:</u> *Modification to Location Reporting Requirements for For-Hire Vessels*

Established an exemption to the VMS requirement due to unforeseen failures in a VMS unit

Framework Action: Modification of For-Hire Vessel Trip Declaration Requirements

Require federally-permitted for-hire vessel owners and/or operators to submit a trip declaration for trips that will be engaging in any type of fishing or chartered activity.

Court decision: Appellate court ruled to set aside the program in its entirety
