Allocation Review and Reallocation Amendments Update

- Council established allocation review triggers
- Council published expected start dates for allocation reviews and indicated that it could initiate additional reviews as needed
- Based on amendments including allocation reviews, the Council either maintained status quo or decided to reallocate
- Pending next allocation review
- Motion to initiate reallocation amendment
- Interdependence of red snapper allocations

Definitions

- ❖ Fisheries Allocation: a "direct and deliberate distribution of the opportunity to participate in a fishery among identifiable, discrete user groups or individuals."
- Fisheries Allocation Review: the evaluation that leads to the decision of whether or not the development and evaluation of allocation options is warranted, but is not, in and of itself, an implicit trigger to consider alternative allocations.
- Evaluation of Fisheries Allocation Options for an FMP Amendment: If the allocation review determines a reallocation is warranted, then the full analysis and evaluation of allocation options should be initiated. The goal is an FMP amendment (or framework action) to update the allocation or maintain status quo.

Reef Fish Amendment 53: Commercial/recreational allocation review and reallocation for **red grouper**

Current allocation: 59.3% commercial and 40.7% recreational based on the average landings using Fishing Effort Survey (FES)-adjusted Marine Recreational Information Program (MRIP-FES) data from 1986 - 2005

Previous allocation: 76% commercial and 24% recreational based on the average landings using Marine Recreational Fisheries Statistics Survey (MRFSS) data from 1986 - 2005

- Final rule effective: June 1, 2022
- Next allocation review: June 1, 2029

Reef Fish Amendment 54: Commercial/recreational allocation review and reallocation for **greater amberjack**

Current allocation: 20% commercial and 80% recreational based on the average landings using MRIP-FES data from 1993 - 2019

Previous allocation: 27% commercial and 73% recreational based on the average landings using MRFSS data from 1981 - 2004

- Final rule effective: July 17, 2023
- Next allocation review: July 17, 2029

Reef Fish Amendment 56: Commercial/recreational allocation review and reallocation for **gag**

Expected allocation: 35% commercial and 65% recreational based on the average landings using MRIP-FES/SRFS data from 1986 - 2005

Previous allocation: 39% commercial and 61% recreational based on the average landings using MRFSS data from 1986 - 2005

- Final rule effective: ongoing rulemaking
- Next allocation review: Final rule date + 7 years

CMP Amendment 33: Commercial/recreational allocation review and reallocation alternatives for Gulf group **King mackerel**.

Current allocation: 32% commercial and 68% recreational based on the average landings using data from 1975-1979.

- Council decided to maintain status quo. Motion to make Alternative 1 the preferred and cease work on this amendment; motion approved October 27, 2022
- Next allocation review: October 27, 2028

Allocation Amendments and Reviews under Development

- South Atlantic Amendment 44 / Gulf Reef Fish Amendment 55: South Atlantic/Gulf of Mexico allocation review and reallocation alternatives for yellowtail snapper
- Current allocation: 75% South Atlantic and 25% Gulf of Mexico based on 50% of average landings from 1993-2008, plus 50% on the average landings from 2006-2008, using MRFSS.
- Timeline: ongoing

Allocation Amendments and Reviews in Development

Reef Fish Amendment 58: Commercial/recreational allocation review and reallocation for other shallow water grouper (SWG)

Current allocation: commercial sector takes 73.9% of the scamp, yellowmouth grouper, black grouper, and yellowfin grouper <u>combined</u>, based on landings during years 2001-2004, using MRFSS.

Timeline: ongoing

Allocation Review


- Recreational allocation between the private angling and federal for-hire components for red snapper
- Preliminary work
- Progress conditional upon availability of updated red snapper recreational data
- Ongoing red snapper data stock assessment
- Council may include allocation review in an amendment considering reallocation alternatives upon availability of red snapper stock status

Allocation Reviews and Amendments Motions

- Motion: To direct staff to begin work on a plan amendment to look at updating the states private recreational allocations for red snapper. (April 2022)
- Current allocation: Based on 2018-2019 State Red Snapper Management exempted fishing permits (EFP)

- Timeline for assessment results

Reef Fish Amendment 53: Commercial/recreational allocation review and reallocation for **red grouper**

- Final rule effective: June 1, 2022
- Next allocation review: June 1, 2029
- Note: SEDAR 88 will evaluate Florida's State Reef Fish Survey (SRFS) landings data for private recreational vessels
 - Use of SRFS is expected to affect allocation percentages for the current reference period
 - Management advice expected to be available late 2024 to early 2025
